Thirty-six members of the Little Apple Chorus, looking dapper in their red, white and blue vests, took the stage for almost an hour's performance for the 18th annual Geary County Historical Society's gala. The theme, "Of Thee I Sing", was carried out by the decorations, music and a special tribute display to Junction City veterans.

The Junction City Municipal Auditorium was filled to capacity with nearly 500 guests and volunteers, who enjoyed a meal while the Junction City Municipal Band played. Following the meal

and a brief recognition program for the Historical Society, the Chorus took the stage and opened with "I Feel a Song Coming On." The opening set also included a selection of our religious songs being prepared for summer church performances. It was also the debut for the **Men of A Chord** on stage with the Chorus, singing "Operator." The **Manhattan Music Machine** and **Charades** also entertained with their unique brand of humor and ringing chords.

The last half of the show featured a patriotic set that included two sing-alongs--"My

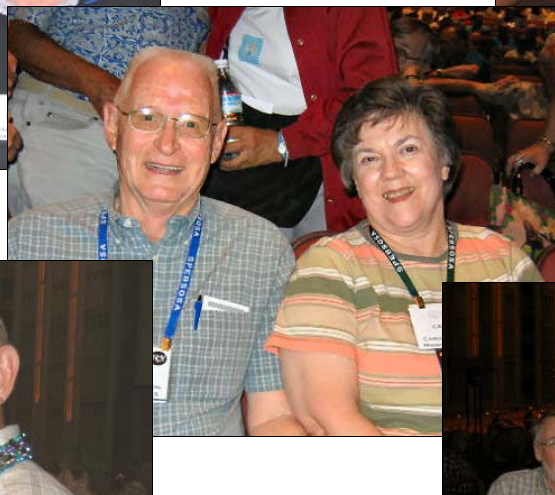

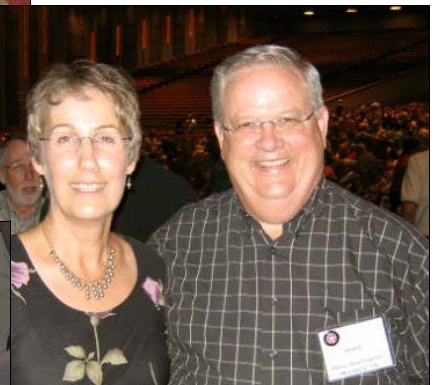

Manhattan chapter members score high with awards at Salt Lake City

Two members of the Manhattan, Kansas Barbershop Chapter received prestigious awards during the International Convention of the Barbershop Harmony Society held in Salt Lake City, Utah the 3rd through the 10th of July. **Bart Bartholomew**, editor of the Manhattan Chapter Newsletter, *InCider Press*, won the International Barbershop Harmony Society award for the best online newsletter and **Bob Swenson**, chapter secretary, was presented a service award for Honorable and Faithful Service as an active, certified contest judge for a period exceeding ten years.

Bart's award is chronicled in another article in this newsletter. Suffice it to say in this article, Congratulations **Bart**, for a superb job in publishing the chapter newsletter and for the much deserved award and honor.

The Society Contest and Judging Committee presented **Bob's** award for his service as a contest administrator. The contest administrator is one of, if not THE most important position, on the judging team responsible for adjudicating the performances of quartets and choruses at divisional, district and international conventions and contests. Over the past ten years **Bob** has served as an administrator or assistant

administrator at all three levels in contests held throughout the continental United States and Canada.

Prior to becoming a member of the "judging fraternity" all society judges go through an intense training program that in most cases spans at least a three-year period. After being accepted as a "candidate judge," individuals attend numerous weekend and weeklong training sessions at their own expense and serve as candidate judges until they pass a difficult certification test.

As a Certified Contest Administrator, **Bob** is responsible for managing the judging team and for operating the computer program which tallies and calculates all of the contestant scores as determined by the category judges. He is also responsible for mitigating any conflicts regarding possible performance penalties and scheduling via computer the coaching sessions which are a vital part of every contest. His final public activity at each contest is to announce the contest winners in reverse order of finish.

Congratulations **Bob**, for the service award and thank you for all of the work you do for the Barbershop Harmony Society in your various roles and for all the work you do for our chapter. We are PROUD of you!

Summer church performances - - two down and one to go

Sunday, July 17 began a three-week stretch for the annual summer church performances for the Little Apple Chorus. Providing special music while church choirs are on summer vacation is a great community service activity for the Chorus and has almost become a regular expectation for some churches!

There were 27 members singing for six different services at five Manhattan churches on July 17. A new venue this year was the contemporary worship service in the Family Life Center of University Christian Church.

On July 24, to allow coverage of a wider geographical area, the chorus was divided into two very large quar-

tets (VLQ). One VLQ sang in the Keats, Riley and Manhattan areas while the second sang in the Council Grove and Wilsey, Kansas areas.

The final Sunday for church performances will be July 31 when the entire chorus will sing in the final four churches in Manhattan.
